What is the PRES?



- PRES is the *Postgraduate Research Experience Survey*, a national survey of PGR students, available to all UK HEIs and produced and administered by the UK based Charity, AdvanceHE.
- The survey is available every year, but most HEIs only take part every two years.
- The survey consists of approximately 44 core questions, in 9 sections, with an additional 16 demographic or programme specific questions, and an additional 10 open questions.
- AdvanceHE provides the survey and question formats, but individual HEIs are responsible for encouraging their own students to complete the survey.
- The surveys are usually live between February and mid May, with AdvanceHE providing national benchmark data and summaries in July each year.

History of PRES surveys at Portsmouth

- UoP conducted their first PRES survey in 2011
- Conducted Annually since 2013 (except in 2020)
- PRES results are written up into a comprehensive report and used by Graduate School, departments and faculties to identify problem areas and areas of good practice
- Since 2021 PRES scores have been used in formal internal quality assessments of each department's PGR students.
- Response rates are therefore very important at UoP to ensure representative data and to persuade staff and students of the credibility and reliability of the PRES scores.

Why do we usually get good response rates?

- Probably *not* because our students are keener and more engaged a community than other universities...
- Probably not because of the size of our University our 900 PRES - eligible students place us as a medium sized provider of PGR degrees.
- Probably *not* because we have a fully financed oncampus captive audience – more than half of our students are Part-time, 25% are Prof Docs.



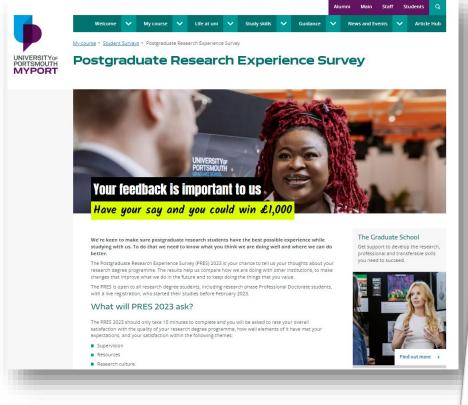
- Probably *not* because we are the best rated university for PGRs in the country (although we are usually above the sector average).
- More likely it's because we redesigned and restructured our survey distribution and reminder procedures in 2014 because we were very disappointed with our response rates and tasked one of our survey methods experts to rethink our approach.

Messages and Reminders



- Each year the local PRES Survey team discusses and then agrees a reference set of email templates, with the wording and dates of all messages agreed in advance.
- The reminder messages are consciously designed to appeal to different types of respondent, with reminders only sent to PGRs who have yet to return the survey.
- After 1 week: "Did you forget to complete the PRES 2021 survey?" Polite reminder with a similar level of information to the main survey invite.
- After 2 weeks: "Your response to the Postgraduate Research Experience Survey 2021" 'I am writing to formally remind you...' formally worded message from the PVC.
- After 3 weeks: "PRES 2021 survey please respond" A brief email emphasising how short the survey is, the prize draw, and how the reminders will stop if they return the survey.
- After 4 weeks: "PRES 2021 survey only one more week to respond" Chatty email reminding them of the advantages to them personally of completing the survey.
- After 5 weeks: "PRES 2021 Survey is about to close HAVE YOUR SAY and be entered in the £1,000 prize draw!" final reminder emphasising how important it is to our university to have a good response rate.

After the PRES...

- We decided in 2013 to conduct the PRES every year, and now have 10 years of longitudinal data on PGR satisfaction at our university.
- The full (45pp) PRES report, including SPSS and Excel templates, was created in-house by our Graduate School and now is used by the University survey team to quickly fill-in-the-gaps for the new report each year.
- The PRES can be a treasure trove of information and data. As DoGs, I probably refer to the data within the summary report at least once every week.
- Since 2021, five of the main PRES questions have been used in our annual departmental quality enhancement exercise. This concentrates minds wonderfully when it comes to following up on PRES actions ©
- This all contributes to the perceived relevance and therefore the importance of the PRES in the University.







Other tips...

- Make sure your Faculty Academic and Departmental leads are aware of the importance of the PRES and are willing to email reminders to local supervisors and students if needed.
- Ensure the sample frame is carefully specified. No point in sending surveys to students who are not available (e.g. currently interrupting) or won't be looking at their emails.



- Our single big £1,000 prize seems to work better than many smaller prizes. We make a big fuss of the Prize winner.
- Plan and prepare. Even the day and time of the survey email and reminders are carefully planned (usually 11am on a Tuesday).
- If I had to recommend one thing: Provide strong encouragement to your PGR leads (and possibly Heads and Research Leads) by sending them a comparison of all departmental response rates each week the survey is open.

Colour coding indicates PRES 2021 sector quartile where (e.g.) a score in the top quartile places the area of the university indicated in the top 25% of universities who undertook PRES 2021.
